Also in attendance were members of the Board of Directors of the Alumni Association. Josh Gross '91, President of the Alumni Association, was the MC at the induction and introduced each of the inductees and presented each with a plaque commemorating their placement on the Hall of Fame. Immediately after the induction ceremonies,

the Spring Musical, *Grease*, took place in the school auditorium.

To be considered for the Hall of Fame an alum must be a graduate of Beverly (there are some accomplished individuals who have attended Beverly but did not graduate). There are certain parameters that are considered with respect to consideration for the Hall of Fame and they include the person's accomplishments and if that

person made an unusual and noteworthy contribution to whatever profession or endeavor in which the person was involved.

Further, has the person received recognition within the area of the person's activities and has the person been the recipient of awards, honors, etc., and has that person had national or local recognition with respect to activities and accomplishments. There are a

variety of considerations that are evaluated by the Hall of Fame Committee. Also, does the person to be nominated have desire to be considered for the Hall of Fame.

Send nominations to the Hall of Fame Committee, c/o Joanna Stingray, BHHS Alumni Association, 241 Moreno Dr., Beverly Hills, CA 90212. By the way the nominator does not have to be a former student or graduate of Beverly.

Former mayor of Beverly Hills is inducted

Barry Brucker '75 has served the city of Beverly Hills as mayor since his election in March of 2008. He first joined the Beverly Hills City Council in 2005.

During his tenure as a city representative, Barry has promoted parkland upgrades for both Roxbury Park and La Cienega Park. In addition, he has actively supported the most robust Green Building Standards in California, insuring the city's environmental sustainability. He also wrote the most comprehensive Code of Ethics Ordinance in the state and the city's first Outdoor Dining Smoke-Free Ordinance.

In 1997, Barry was elected as a write-in candidate for Beverly Hills Unified School District, becoming the first elected official at that time to win as a write-in candidate in California in 15 years. He was re-elected in 2001 and served two terms as school board president in 1999 and 2003. During his time on the school board, Barry helped complete

\$100 million in stalled school improvement projects.

In addition to his civic service, Barry is the president and CEO of Independent Ink, Inc. an international manufacturer

of digital and security printing inks. He holds six U.S. patents in digital and security printing technologies and has been a featured speaker at seminars and conferences on digital printing

and anti-counterfeit technologies.

In 1999, the Amie Karen Children's Cancer Fund recognized Barry as its Humanitarian of the Year.

Barry attended Beverly Vista School and graduated from Beverly Hills High School in 1975. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree with honors in business/economics from the University of California, Santa Barbara. He is a member of the economics honor society, Omicron Delta Epsilon.

In the past, he served as president of Concern II Children's Cancer Foundation and vice president of Beverly Hills Education Foundation. He currently serves as a director of Friends of Sheba Hospital.

Barry and his wife Sue both hold black belts in karate. They have two children: Richard '03, a graduate of Tulane University Medical School who is currently a physician in Albuquerque, and Lauren '06 who attends Loyola Law School.

Innovative architect William Krisel S'41 inducted

William Krisel S'41 has made a major, positive impact on the field of architecture for both single-family and multi-family housing. In his 61 years as a licensed California architect, about 25,000 single-family homes and 15,000 multi-family units have been built from his architectural designs.

Since 1950, William has had his own architectural practice. He has worked as an architectural educator, lecturer, author and mentor to young architects. Also licensed as a landscape architect since 1954, he has designed for schools, hospitals, museums, shopping centers and office buildings.

Throughout his career, William also reached out for good relationships with the builder-developer community, which in the past had avoided the use of architects on their projects.

"He brought excellent and elegant modern design to mass-produced housing," wrote Alan Hess, architect, author and critic. "That is significant because many big names in modern architecture during the mid-century, tried to crack into the mass-produced housing market and they all failed."

After graduating from



Beverly Hills High School, William earned his bachelor's degree in architecture from the University of Southern California in 1949.

His college career was interrupted by three years in the U.S. Army during World War II. He was awarded a Bronze Star for his military service overseas.

Starting in 1950, William created reliable connections

with builder-developers in California, Florida, Texas, Arizona, Nevada and Colorado.

Since then, thousands of citizens have lived in and appreciated the benefits of his homes.

"What Bill Krisel did was bring modernism to the masses," said Michael Stern, noted author and museum curator. "Krisel packed

excellent architecture into houses of modest size, made of modest materials, and he did it on a very thin dime."

William's architecture has been recognized by the American Institute of Architects and the J. Paul Getty Trust Research Institute of the Getty Museum, which acquired his architectural archive for their permanent collection.

Walt Dougher, '53, served as mayor of Manhattan Beach

Walt Dougher, '53, has devoted many years of his life to leading and serving his community.

In 1999, he successfully ran for City Council in Manhattan Beach and served as Mayor in 2001. During his four-year term, Walt oversaw the groundbreaking and completion of several construction projects in the city, including the Metlox Parking and Commercial Center, the Marine Avenue Sports Complex, the Creative Arts Center, and the South Bay Regional Public Communication Facility.

Walt and his wife Barbara have lived in Manhattan Beach for 44 years. They have four sons and ten grandchildren. Walt met Barbara at Beverly Hills High School and they have been constant companions for over 62 years. They will celebrate their 55th wedding anniversary in September 2012.

While at Beverly Hills High School (1949-1953), Walt served as President of the Squires, Knights, and the Junior Class. The American Legion selected him to represent the High School at Boy's State in 1952. He was Captain of the football team and was named to the All-Bay League team in 1952 and 1953.

Walt graduated with a B.A. Degree in Economics from Pomona College in 1957. At Pomona, he was awarded a four-year Crown-Zellerbach Scholarship. He served as president of his fraternity and of the men's honor organization. In sports, he received two freshman and six varsity letters in football and track and was selected on the S.C.I.A.C All-league football team in his junior and senior years. He was captain of the track team.

In the 1950s, Walt served in the U.S. Army as a training officer and general staff secretary. After leaving the active army, he continued to serve in the Army Reserve until 1968.

Walt joined the Southern California Edison Company in 1958. He held numerous positions at Edison including credit manager, area manager of Beverly Hills and district manager for the Porterville, Inglewood, Compton, Huntington Beach, and South Bay Districts.

In 1978 he was named manager of personnel and employee development. He concluded his service with Edison as regional manager of public affairs, responsible for Edison's relations

with cities and elected officials in much of Los Angeles County.

Upon Walt's retirement in 1997, he became the Interim Executive Director of the Manhattan Beach Chamber of Commerce on two occasions. He served as President of the Redondo Beach Chamber of Commerce in 1992-93 and Vice President of the South Bay Association of Chambers of Commerce in 1994. He has served on the Boards of The Beverly Hills, Porterville, Redondo Beach, and Inglewood Chambers of Commerce.

Walt currently serves on the Power 9 Advisory Panel for the

implementation of the Vitality City concept in the three South Bay Cities of Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach, and Redondo Beach.

Walt received the Rose & Scroll from the Manhattan Beach Chamber of Commerce in 1999. The Los Angeles County Commission on Aging recognized him for Community Service in 2002, and he received the Dominguez Brand Award of community service in 1993. In addition, he was named Citizen of the Year award for the Manhattan Beach Hermosa Beach Lions Club in 2006.

Dr. Elinor Ostrom '51 won Nobel Prize in Economic Sciences

Indiana University Distinguished Professor Elinor Ostrom '51 was the first woman to be awarded the Nobel Prize for Economic Sciences. She passed away June 12, 2012, at IU Health Bloomington Hospital at the age of 78 after a battle with cancer.

Ostrom received the 2009 Nobel Prize in Economic Sciences for her groundbreaking research demonstrating that ordinary people are capable of creating rules and institutions that allow for the sustainable and equitable management of shared resources.

A member of Beverly Hills High School's Hall of Fame, Ostrom was senior research director of the Vincent and Elinor Ostrom Workshop in Political Theory and Policy Analysis.

The recipient of numerous international awards and honorary degrees, Ostrom was selected in April as one of the 'Time 100 for 2012,' *Time* magazine's annual list of the world's 100 most influential people. In May, the IU Board of Trustees renamed the Workshop

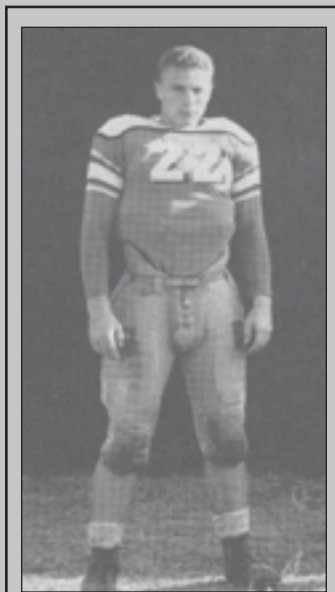
Stewart 'Tike' Tinsman S'44 led many teams

Acclaimed songwriter Robert Sherman was also a war hero

Robert B. Sherman S'43 passed away in London, England on March 6, 2012.

Bob and his brother, Richard S'45, were American songwriters who specialized in musical films. They both won an Academy Award in 1965 for writing the music and lyrics for the movie, *Mary Poppins*.

As a youth Bob took up the violin, piano, painting and writing poetry. After moving from New York to Beverly Hills, Bob attended El Rodeo School and Beverly High.

At age 16, he wrote a stage play that yielded thousands of dollars for War Bonds and earned a special citation from the War Department.

Nora Ephron '58 passed away on June 26, 2012. At Beverly, she was editor of the Highlights. She is on the Hall of Fame of the high school, the nominee of 3 Academy Awards for writing. She was also a director.

Ephron, the writer of such iconic films as "Harry Met

Sally," "Sleepless in Seattle," and "You've Got Mail," was 71 years of age.

Ephron is survived by her son, filmmaker Nicholas Pillegi, 79, her two children from her previous marriage to journalist Carl Bernstein, and her sister, Delia '62.



He was voted the "most popular teacher" for ten years in a row while at Beverly. He traveled extensively all over the world as well as with his students and took them on 45 trips to the Soviet Union. He is survived by his partner, Ricardo Rosas, nieces and nephews.

Marie Glasser died on August 26, 2011. She taught French in the BHUSD for 25 years and then taught English as a second language in the Beverly Hills Adult School for 13 years. Marie was born in Romania and came to this country in 1949 as a survivor of Auschwitz Concentration Camp. Prior to that, she had lost all of her family members in the Holocaust. She was a survivor speaker at the Museum of Tolerance. She is survived by her husband of 60 years, Paul Malmuth, and a daughter and two grandchildren.

Jill Kinmount Boothe died in February, 2012. In the 70's she taught remedial reading in the Beverly Hills School System. At the age of 18, she was the women's national slalom champion. She had been on the cover of Sports Illustrated and while trying out for the U.S. Olympic Team, she lost control and hit a tree. Her neck had been broken and her skiing career had ended. She was confined to a wheel chair for the rest of her life. But she learned to write, type and paint with the use of a hand brace. After moving back with her parents, she earned a teaching certificate from the University of Washington. Through her life she suffered many losses. Her

teenage boy friend was killed in an avalanche, a second love died in a plane crash, and a UCLA friend who mentored her succumbed to an undiagnosed disease. Her life and losses were the subject of a book and two movies. In Bishop, CA Jill continued to teach, instructing learning and physically disabled children in the last years of her life. She is survived by her husband, John Boothe.

Steve Miletich died on Oct. 21, 2011. He was 92 years of age. Coach Miletich was born in Albia, Iowa and was an all-league basketball player in high school. He received a scholarship from the University of Southern California and was a forward on the basketball team in the early 1940's. He came to Beverly in 1948 as the basketball coach and was also a teacher and after coaching became the Boy's Vice Principal. He worked for 30 years for the high school. During his years at the high

school, he was much more than a coach and an administrator. He developed friendships with many of the students that endured until his passing. After his retirement, he often attended meetings of the high school Alumni Association. It was part of his nature to stay involved with those he had come to know and enjoy. He and his wife, Peggy, were married for 66 years and she passed away some four months prior to Steve's passing. He is survived by his two daughters, seven grandchildren and six great grandchildren. He was completely devoted to his wife and family and was immensely proud of his children and their offspring. Steve was a role model to all those that knew him.

Yvonne Risher Peniston died on Nov. 29, 2011 at the age of 92. She was a reading specialist at El Rodeo School. She leaves two daughters, 11 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

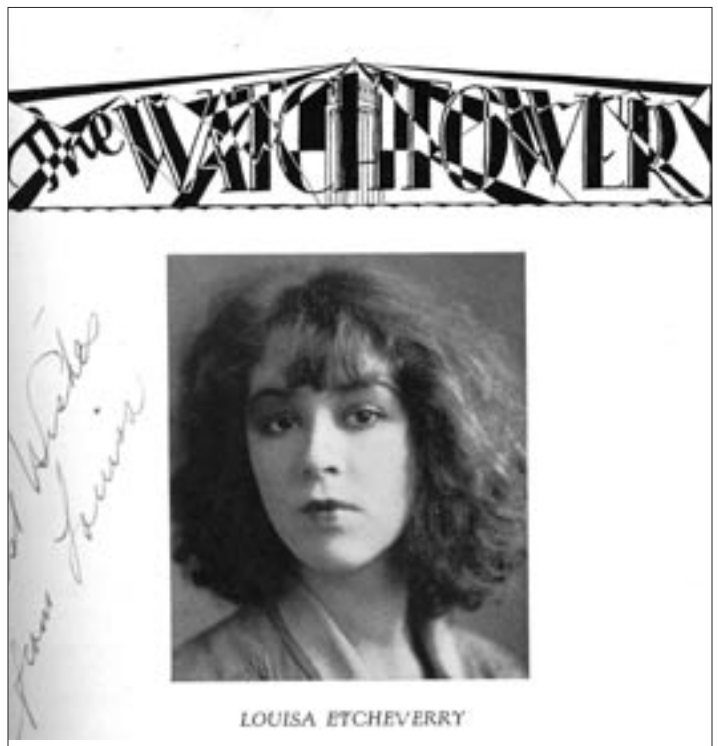

Beverly Hills High School: An 85-year history

This fall, it will be 85 years ago that Beverly opened its doors. The year was 1927. Beverly Hills High School was formally dedicated on November 23, 1927. A banquet including over 300 people was held in the cafeteria and many officials and community leaders attended. Later, in the auditorium, the Superintendent of the Los Angeles School District, Susan M. Dorsey, gave the main address. When the school opened, it was part of the L.A. Unified School District.

The city of Beverly Hills was incorporated on January 28, 1914 and by 1920 the population was 674; however, there was spectacular growth and by 1930 there was a population 17,429. Currently, the population is 34,109. The growth of the population in 1920's created a need for a high school for the city. Prior to the opening of the high school, students had to travel to Fairfax High School (located at Melrose Ave. and Fairfax Ave.) and other high schools outside of Beverly Hills.

Prior to 1914, there was only one school in Beverly Hills. Called the Canyon School, it was a one room school house in a field north of Sunset Blvd. near Coldwater Canyon. When Hawthorne School was built in 1914, the Canyon School disappeared. Following Hawthorne, were Beverly Vista in 1924, El Rodeo in 1927 and Horace Mann in 1929.

When Beverly High opened in 1927, there were little more than a dozen students in the senior class. The Junior Class numbered 112 students, the Sophomore Class had 192 and the Freshman Class had 196. There were about 500 students in the high school. Today, there are over 2,300 students. And when the school opened there were 28 teachers. Today, there are over 100 teachers.

There was no student government when the school opened. On January 28, 1928, the school committee drew up a constitution and it invested legislative and executive

powers in 14 commissioners. Soon, there was created the Boys' League, the Boys' Court and Girls' Court. The Board of Commissioners included a student body president and various other offices and officers. The initial student body had the responsibility of creating and establishing many of the student offices and activities that had not existed. They were responsible for also creating a spirit of progress for the school. Additionally, the Highlights and the Watchtower were created along with a number of school clubs and organizations. In those early days there was one coach who coached football, basketball, baseball and scheduled all of the events. The girls had club sports such as swimming, riding, golf, etc. The next year in 1929 the boys' basketball team and track team won the league championship.

In the first Watchtower(1928) the forward was written by Will Rogers, the famous entertainer,

writer and vaudeville star. And in that first Watchtower, there is printed the words that have endured for some 85 years: "Each today well lived makes every yesterday a dream of happiness and every tomorrow a vision of hope."

The school teams were known as the "Tartars." However, in 1931 the student body president, John Guedel, didn't like the looks of the scruffy looking Tartar that was depicted. Because of the French Normandy architecture, Guedel decided that "Normans" would be a more appropriate name and it has remained the Normans since that time.

Although the LAUSD built

the school, in 1935 the Beverly Hills Unified School District was formed and took control of the high school and the four K-8 schools. The famous swim-gym was built as part of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt's government stimulus packages in the late 30's and early 40's. The swim-gym was designed by Stiles O. Clement and built in 1939. Former Beverly basketball coach, Sax Elliott, was instrumental in the building of the swim gym which he innovated with solid glass backboards. Up until that time, wooden backboards were utilized and those backboard cut off the view of those sitting in back of them. When the

swim gym opened, coaches and officials from other schools and universities came to take a look and they asked Coach Eliot if the rules permitted glass backboards. He replied that no where in the rules does it state what material should be used for the backboards. And since then, glass and see through backboards are used for all basketball games. The swim gym has been used in several movies.

Beverly Hills High School is probably the most famous of any high school in the country. The name is known everywhere. From an academic standpoint the school has always been superior. As a California Distinguished

School, Beverly has consistently made its way in the academic spotlight. Beverly has been awarded the Blue Ribbon School of Excellence by the U.S. Department of Education. This is the highest award an American school can achieve. In order to continue its excellent academic standing, the school has added a new Science and Technology Center which was completed recently. Additionally, the Performing Arts Department has received numerous awards and recognition. The school's newspaper, The Highlights, has won awards in national journalism contests and the school's television station (KBV) has the country's longest running televised high school news program.

The school's Hall of Fame includes several congressman, five Academy Award winners, several Emmy winners, the Chief Justice of the California Supreme Court, mayors and members of the L.A. County Board of Supervisors, two Olympic Gold Medal winners, Chairmen/CEO's of major corporations, outstanding musicians, a prima ballerina, outstanding athletes and many more accomplished graduates. One can access the internet and find a list of many accomplished graduates who attended Beverly. From its founding until the late 60's, the students were almost all Caucasian. Now the school has a diversified enrollment and about 35% of the students were born outside of the United States and 40% speak a first language other than English.

Beverly High has had a great history and because Beverly Hills is a relatively small city, there is much interest by the residents that the high school maintains its high academic standards. Based on past history, that reputation will endure throughout future years.

Talented war reporter's life was cut short

Melville Jacoby, '33, died April 29, 1942 alongside Brigadier General Harold George in a random airfield accident in Australia. He was just 25 years old, but his life was packed with more accomplishments than many of us can claim in twice as many years.

Before the attack on Pearl Harbor, Jacoby had lived with a Chinese warlord's son, met Henry Luce and worked as a stringer for *Time*, *Life*, the *UPI* and others. Mel quickly earned respect for his coverage of the undeclared war between Japan and China. He sent radio broadcasts and photos from the nationalists' bombed capital at Chungking (AKA Chongqing); chronicled the exiled Jewish community in Shanghai; profiled Chiang Kai-Shek and Madame Chiang (who gave Mel wedding gifts and sent condolences to his family upon his death); and was arrested by the Japanese on suspicion of espionage. Along the way, Mel earned a masters degree from Stanford. His thesis challenged newspapers' lack of interest in the violence ravaging Asia while breathlessly covering the hostilities looming over Europe.

Amid the onset of war, Mel fell in love with fellow journalist Annalee Whitmore, one of the first female war correspondents. The two married just before Pearl Harbor, cut their honeymoon short in a dramatic escape from Manila in which they leapt from a burning dock onto one of the last boats leaving the city before the Japanese occupation, and proceeded to cover the conflict. When they left the Philippines they traveled slowly, often under the cover of darkness, first to Bataan and then from island to island, risking attack or capture, until they finally made it to Australia a short time before Mel's untimely death.

A Los Angeles native (Jacob

Stern, Mel's grandfather, rented out the barn in which Jesse L. Lasky and Cecil B. DeMille launched the studio that would come to be known as Paramount), Mel quickly rose to prominence and respect as a foreign correspondent. Before that, he grew up attending both Selma Avenue elementary and the Hawthorne School, as well as Beverly Hills High.

At BHHS, Mel had been a two-time letterman on the swim team, a member of the Beverly Knights honor society, a Pallidian and the news editor of the school's paper. He went on from Beverly Hills to earn both a B.A. and M.A. from Stanford, where he studied journalism. He also spent a year as an exchange student at Lingnan University, near Canton, in China.

Mel returned multiple times to China. He spent a large amount of time working in Chungking, where he set up a radio link between that besieged city and the U.S. for news broadcasts and contact with officials. Mel worked closely with many well-known reporters of the era, including Theodore White, Carl Mydans and Clark Lee, among others, and he earned the respect of government and military officials as well as everyday people. In

addition to *Time*, Mel's work also appeared in the *UPI*, the *Los Angeles Times Sunday Magazine*, the *San Francisco Chronicle*, *Newsweek* and elsewhere. When he died, Mel became the first Time reporter killed in the line of duty (indeed, a ship named for Melville Jacoby to honor his contributions later became a private vessel that famously shipwrecked off the Palos Verdes Peninsula).

Now a relative of Mel's who is also a journalist is working to tell Mel's story and describe his adventures as a reporter in China and the Phillipines. Bill Lascher, whose grandmother was Mel's younger cousin, is researching and writing a book and ebook about Mel's life. Edward L. Butterworth, S'32, was president of Beverly Hills High School's Senior Class in 1932. Today, Butterworth is 97 and living with his wife Shirley in Arcadia, a city he served as mayor from 1962-63 and 1970-71.

In addition to his career in public service, Butterworth practiced law after graduating from Stanford University. In World War II, Butterworth served as a lieutenant in the Navy.

In a letter to the Alumni Association, Butterworth wrote, "I look back over my life and think my time at Beverly Hills High School was as much a foundation of my life and career as was my attendance at Stanford."

Butterworth and his wife, whom he met at Stanford University, have five children and "more grandchildren than [they] can count."

While at Beverly, Butterworth was a very active student. In addition to his election as senior class president, he served as homeroom officer twice, worked on the staff of the 1931 Watchtower yearbook, and participated in the World Friendship Council. He was also a Torchbearer, a Knight, chairman of the Debate Team, and an officer of the Hi-Y Club. Twice, he served as the commissioner of student government.

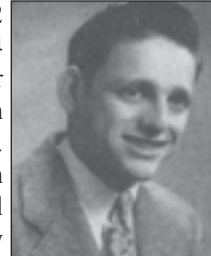
Yes, it was the greatest generation.

He returned to UCLA in fall 2009 as a history major and with a determination to receive his BA degree. Goal accomplished.

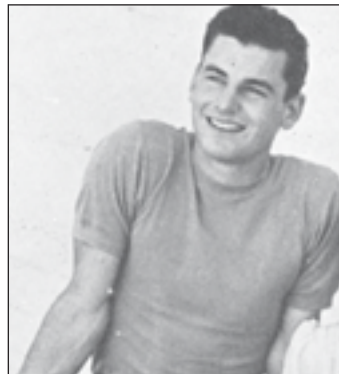
Many of Art's children and grandchildren attended graduation ceremony on June 17th.

Aerospace engineer endowed several scholarships

Allan Harris S'41 was one of those who were named "The Greatest Generation." Allan grew up during the depression; however, during those years, there was a certain degree of carefree youthfulness at Beverly. Students, such as Al went to the movies, had part time jobs, studied and many involved themselves in athletics of various sorts in addition to service to the high school.

In those days congestion did not exist, the ocean was not polluted and if one went to the beach with friends, there was plenty of free parking available on Pacific Coast Highway. There was crime, but there were no gangs and drugs were almost non-existent. And then came World War II on Dec. 7, 1941.

In high school, Allan was student body president, a member of the Knights, Norman Lettermen: he played basketball and first string guard on the varsity basketball team. When he graduated, he had the distinction

of being voted Most Likely to Succeed, Most Popular and Best Looking. Also, academically he was a Sealbearer, Ephebian and received the Faculty Scholarship Cup.

In Fall of '41 Allan entered Stanford University. Due to the war, Al became a member of the Army Enlisted Reserve; however, in November, 1943, Al was called up and after boot camp, he was accepted into the infantry school. He then trained new recruits at Camp Roberts, CA. He was finally ordered overseas and was

two days from the Philippines when Japan surrendered.

Al went back to Stanford, lettered on the boxing team and received a degree in Industrial Engineering. He began working after graduation and in October, 1950 was called back into the Army as a Rifle Platoon Leader during the Korean War. He was discharged from the Army in 1952.

Al began working in the aerospace industry and moved to Seattle in 1956 where he worked on various systems and components with Boeing during the development of the 707 and other aircraft. In 1958 Allan moved back to Palo Alto where he started his own company representing manufacturers of aerospace components.

In 1959 Allan married Betty Lindsay whom he had met in Seattle. They have a daughter, Lindsay, who became a pilot and also has a son who is 9 years old. Their son, Steele, is an educator

and is married and the father of twins, a boy and a girl.

During the 60's with the rapid growth of the Silicon Valley, Allan participated in various real estate investments which enabled Allan and his wife to endow both Engineering and Athletic Scholarships at Stanford. He has served as Chairman of the Engineering Fund and later as Chairman of the Buck/Cardinal Club (fundraising) and a member of the Stanford Athletic Board. For his contributions to Stanford Al has been honored by receiving The Golden Spike Award which is the highest award offered by the Stanford Alumni Association.

In spring of this year Al traveled to Fresno to watch the Stanford Women's Basketball Team play in the regional finals. And later Al traveled to Philadelphia in order to view a Van Gogh exhibit. He remains active and has served as a role model for all who have known him.

Legendary college athlete celebrates 87 years

John Roesch W'43 celebrated his 87th birthday on Feb. 19, 2012 at a surprise party arranged by his daughters Sigi and Heidi.

But first let's talk about John's athletic accomplishments at Beverly and UCLA. John was undoubtedly one of the greatest running back in the history of Beverly. He was shifty, fast and strong. Some said he could run as fast sideways as he could going forward.

He was All League and voted the most valuable player on the team by his teammates on the 1942 team.

At UCLA as a freshman, John was the leading ground gainer for the team as he was in 1944 when he was named All Coast.

His most memorable game was against USC in 1944. In that game with a minute and a half left in the game USC led 13 – 0. UCLA had the ball and

Roesch carried three times and was unstoppable and scored. Bob Waterfield missed the conversion and the score was 13 – 6. USC received the ball and through a series of stopped plays and penalties was forced to punt with about 10 seconds left in the game. Jim Hardy, the great USC quarterback, punted

and Roesch took the punt with a few seconds on the clock and ran 80 yards through the entire USC team for another touchdown as the clock ran out. Bob Waterfield attempted the point after touchdown and his kick hit the crossbar and rolled over and UCLA tied the game.

The L.A. Times wrote a

feature column about the game the next day that took up an entire page. John lettered in football four years at UCLA with a time out while serving in Armed Forces. He was the leading scorer in 1947.

The 87th birthday party was attended by former classmates and teammates of John that included Bob Iverson W'43 (who was the other halfback on the team), Stan Zimmelman W'43, Oscar Samuelson S'42, Bob Nate W'43, Al Lewis W'43, Bob Lewis S'45 and many more friends.

Also in attendance and a speaker was Jim Hardy, the USC quarterback, as in later years, John and Jim became friends.

At Beverly, John was a Knight (the boy's honorary society) and a member of the Norman Letterman. And, now at the age of 87, John still goes to work every day. Many more happy birthdays for John Roesch.

Stanley Levy '59 earns Lifetime Achievement Award

American Lawyer magazine awarded Stanley Levy '59 its American Lawyer's Lifetime Achievement Award for 2011. Levy was recognized for his significant

legal practice and decades of innovation and leadership in the provision of pro bono legal services. The prestigious annual award recognizes those who have gone beyond professional success and made exceptional contributions for the betterment of society.

Since 2008, Levy has directed the creation of the Holocaust Survivors Justice Network, a project that delivers reparations to Holocaust victims.

By September of 2011, the national network had

“helped over 5,000 applicants receive more than \$10 million in one-time reparation payments from the German government,” according to *American Lawyer* magazine.

“The idea that we are responsible for each other has been an important part of my values, the values of my parents, the values of my religion, the values of my country, and the values of my profession,” says the 69-year-old.

Levy's career has been dominated by public interest work. In 1968, two years after graduating from UCLA Law School, he gave up his nascent private practice to join the

Western Center on Law and Poverty, a group that Levy and four other attorneys founded to force systematic change through class actions.

Levy's career has included stints in private practice. At Stein & Kahan, from 1990 to 1992, Levy's practice included representing entertainers in royalty and licensing disputes. Levy's business experience isn't limited to law firms. For three years, beginning in 1979, he ran a record and concert production company that worked with jazz artists such as Nancy Wilson, and from 1992 to 1995 he was general counsel of clothing company Guess?, Inc.

While Levy's jobs have changed over the years, there is one title that has remained the same: rabbi. After graduating

from law school, Levy began attending rabbinical school and in 1968 founded the Congregation B'nai Horin—Children of Freedom in Los Angeles. “I founded it for people who wanted a more contemporary, more meaningful, and more spiritual approach to religion,” says Levy, who early on stood out for his willingness to marry interfaith couples and minister to gays and lesbians. Sandor Samuels, Bet Tzedek's president, sums up Levy's varied careers in one word: “mensch.” Samuels says, “Stan is the embodiment of that phrase because he has done so much to seek justice for people who have been denied it.”

Beverly High graduate is first rheumatoid arthritis patient to conquer Mount Everest

After enduring a 10-hour climb in 70 mile-per-hour winds from the final staging area on Mount Everest, 1991 Beverly High graduate Jeffrey Gottfurcht became the first rheumatoid arthritis patient to reach the summit on May 14, 2011.

Though it had taken Gottfurcht weeks to reach the peak at 29,000 feet, he and his guide, Sherpa Danuru, spent only a few minutes at the summit. Gottfurcht had temporarily lost vision in his left eye due to the freezing, windy conditions. Gottfurcht could not risk losing vision in his right eye, since he still had a 3,000-foot climb back down to camp, which ended up taking 15 hours.

"As I got to the top, I had surrendered to my fate," Gottfurcht said. "I didn't know if I was going to die; I didn't know if I was going to make it to the top. The point is I surrendered to what was going to happen, which enabled me to climb freely."

Gottfurcht may not have anticipated temporary loss of vision, but he expected significant challenges during the climb due to his RA, which he said affects his knees, hips and wrists the most. He managed his joint pain with over-the-counter

medication Nyloxin, which sponsored Gottfurcht's climb.

"In order for me to offset having RA and what that does to my knees, I had to train especially [hard at] something that I could control, [which was] my lungs and my heart," Gottfurcht said. "Obviously when you're climbing at those altitudes, while your legs are important, what's equally important is your ability to pump blood with less oxygen."

Gottfurcht found he was able to do that very well. In addition, he said he was grateful his RA did not flare up during the expedition. That was not the case in 2010, when Gottfurcht made his first attempt at climbing

Mount Everest. At Camp 2, Gottfurcht was about 8,000 feet below the summit when he decided to turn back.

"My wife and I had made a pact that if I didn't feel good that I could go back a second time," Gottfurcht said. "I knew when I was up on Everest I wasn't feeling good. If I had kept going I probably would have met my demise. I prudently made the decision. It was one of the hardest decisions I've ever made in my life, but you don't want to expend your strength prematurely on something that's not yet ripe."

Gottfurcht said it took him seven years of training to achieve his goal. When he was

first diagnosed with RA at age 28, he said it was debilitating as well as difficult for him to accept because he had been an active surfer, hiker and climber since childhood. Gottfurcht said it was the birth of his first child that inspired him to go for his dream of climbing Mount Everest, because he wanted to motivate his children to set lofty goals.

Though Gottfurcht lives with his wife and three children in San Francisco, where he trains, he said he is in Beverly Hills three times a week at The Jeffrey Gottfurcht Children's Arthritis Foundation, which he founded two years ago with encouragement from his father John Gottfurcht. The foundation is devoted to enriching the lives of children with arthritis by introducing them to a hero, sending them to college, or simply giving them the latest iPod or gaming system.

Three of Gottfurcht's Beverly High classmates sit on the foundation's Dream Board, a group of influential physicians, celebrities and corporate executives that help create new opportunities for the foundation.

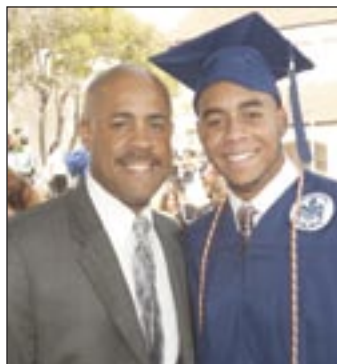

Chaplain faced prejudice, delivered moving eulogy

An interesting fact that many are unaware of is the historic events that surrounded a Jewish chaplain on Iwo Jima, where, of 70,000 American Marines, 1,500 were Jewish.

Rabbi Roland B. Gittelsohn, assigned to the Fifth Marine Division, was the first Jewish chaplain the Marine Corps ever appointed. Rabbi Gittelsohn was in the thick of the fray, ministering to Marines of all faiths in the combat zone. His tireless efforts to comfort the wounded and encourage the fearful won him three service ribbons.

When the fighting was over, Rabbi Gittelsohn was asked to deliver the memorial sermon at a combined religious service dedicating the Marine Cemetery.

Unfortunately, racial and religious prejudice led to problems with the ceremony. What happened next immor-

talized Rabbi Gittelsohn and his sermon forever.

It was Division Chaplain Warren Cuthriell, a Protestant minister, who originally asked Rabbi Gittelsohn to deliver the memorial sermon. Cuthriell wanted all the fallen Marines (black and white, Protestant, Catholic and Jewish) honored in a single, non-denominational ceremony. However, according to Rabbi Gittelsohn's autobiography, the majority of Christian chaplains objected to having a rabbi preach over predominantly Christian graves.

To his credit, Cuthriell refused to alter his plans. Gittelsohn, on the other hand, wanted to save his friend Cuthriell further embarrassment and so decided it was best not to deliver his sermon. Instead, three separate religious services were held.

At the Jewish service, to a congregation of 70 or so who

attended, Rabbi Gittelsohn delivered this powerful eulogy he originally wrote for the combined service:

"Here lie men who loved America because their ancestors, generations ago, helped in her founding. And other men who loved her with equal passion because they themselves, or their own fathers, escaped from oppression to her blessed shores.

"Here lie officers and men, Negroes and Whites, rich men and poor; together. Here are Protestants, Catholics, and Jews together. Here no man prefers another because of his faith or despises him because of his color. Here there are no quotas of how many from each group are admitted or allowed.

"Among these men there is no discrimination. No prejudices. No hatred. Theirs is the highest and purest democracy! Whosoever of us

lifts his hand in hate against a brother, or who thinks himself superior to those who happen to be in the minority, makes of this ceremony and the bloody sacrifice it commemorates, an empty, hollow mockery.

"To this then, as our solemn sacred duty, do we, the living, now dedicate ourselves: To the right of Protestants, Catholics, and Jews, of White men and Negroes alike, to enjoy the democracy for which all of them have here paid the price.

We here solemnly swear this shall not be in vain. Out of this, and from the suffering and sorrow of those who mourn this, will come, we promise, the birth of a new freedom for the sons of men everywhere."

Among Gittelsohn's listeners were three Protestant chaplains so incensed by the prejudice voiced by their colleagues that they boycotted their own service. See *CHAPLAIN*, page 52

'99 alum nabs high-profile arson suspect

Reserve Deputy Sheriff Shervin Lalezary's arrest of arson suspect Harry Burkhart put a stop to what some have called the worst arson spree Los Angeles has seen in decades.

Lalezary, a 1999 Beverly High graduate, made what Los Angeles County Sheriff Lee Baca called the "arrest of his career" after Lalezary spotted Burkhart's Dodge Caravan at 3 a.m. on January 2nd, 2012 and made the traffic stop on Fairfax Avenue just west of Sunset Boulevard.

A Los Angeles Police Department unit that was in the area backed Lalezary up, Lalezary said at a press conference.

"They rolled up right behind me and got out of their car and covered me as I [apprehended] the suspect in the vehicle," Lalezary said.

Burkhart is suspected to have set more than 50 blazes that largely targeted cars parked under dwellings in Los Angeles, West Hollywood and Burbank.

Though Lalezary has been cast as a hero, it seems he would prefer to keep a low profile. After making a brief statement at the West Hollywood Sheriff's Station, where Lalezary said he works once or twice a week as a reserve deputy, Lalezary mostly dodged personal questions.

Asked if he was frightened to apprehend the suspect, Lalezary responded, "I don't want to talk about emotional state."

Instead, Lalezary focused on the facts, and thanking local citizens and law enforcement officials for their collaborative effort.

"Once the fires started

occurring, the citizens of West Hollywood pretty much started calling with every suspicious person that they thought they saw and that went a far ways helping with the investigation that ultimately led to the arrest," Lalezary said.

Lalezary did offer a comment about the connection between his part-time and full-time careers. Lalezary practices law in Beverly Hills.

"I've been interested in both law and law enforcement for several years," Lalezary said. "I think each influences the other."

Through Los Angeles County Sheriff spokesperson Steve Whitmore, Lalezary responded to the Weekly's question about how growing up in Beverly Hills influenced his decision to become a reserve deputy.

"Growing up in Beverly Hills, the family ethic in which he was brought up in and the community in which he lived in emphasized community service,

and that's why he wanted to be an attorney and that's why he joined the reserves," Whitmore said.

Whitmore described Lalezary as very humble.

"He doesn't want to put it on himself," Whitmore said. "He wants to be part of a team."

Though Lalezary said his family inspired him to pursue community service, his family was initially uncomfortable with his decision to become a reserve deputy sheriff.

In an interview in July 2010 that appeared in Issue #562, Lalezary told the Weekly, "Initially, my family was quite hesitant about my involvement in law enforcement. Most parents are not too fond of their children going out with a bulletproof vest and firearm."

He said growing up around Beverly Hills police officers inspired him in part to become a reserve deputy. Reserves earn \$1 a year for their service.

SS: As a teenager. As soon as I got my driver's license and could take myself to the barn, there was

HP: What is the meaning behind the stable name Jay Em Ess?

SS: The 'Jay' is for 'Jan,' which is my mother's name; 'Em' is for my father, 'Mace;' and 'Ess' is for 'Samantha.'

HP: Jay Em Ess Stable has had many different trainers over the years. What is your process for trainer selection?

SS: We like to be in a smaller barn with a trainer who takes good care of his horses. We don't like to switch trainers too often - we have been with our three main trainers for awhile now.

HP: As a woman in the industry, have you felt any added challenges to reaching your level of success?

SS: I'm lucky. I worked for my family, so I haven't had to fight my way into my job.

Alum survives cancer

Karolyn Eisenberg Berkman '54 survived a third breast cancer episode in 2011, though her mammograms and doctors missed the mass as it spread for over a year and a half without any treatment.

"Mammograms never picked up either of my two breast cancers," Berkman writes. "I found them myself, the first 35 years ago and the second one 24 years ago."

to attend Gittelsohn's. One of them borrowed the manuscript and, unknown to Gittelsohn, circulated several thousand copies to his regiment. Some Marines enclosed the copies in letters to their families.

An avalanche of coverage resulted. Time magazine published excerpts, which wire services spread even further. The entire sermon was inserted into the Congressional Record, the Army released the eulogy for short-wave broadcast to American troops throughout the world and radio commentator Robert St. John

read it on his program and on many succeeding Memorial Days.

In 1995, in his last major public appearance before his death, Gittelsohn reread a portion of the eulogy at the 50th commemoration ceremony at the Iwo Jima statue in Washington, D.C. In his autobiography, Gittelsohn reflected, "I have often wondered whether anyone would ever have heard of my Iwo Jima sermon had it not been for the bigoted attempt to ban it."

Alum recalls child-actress days in autobiography

Marilyn Knowlden S'43 hangs posters on the walls of her living room for two purposes: Initially, they recall the 1930s film era, when motion pictures were just beginning to be produced with sound.

Upon closer inspection, their second purpose emerges: Knowlden herself is in many of the pictures as a little girl, wavy hair and pretty face posed just so. A giant, fraying print that was once displayed outside Max Munn Autrey's Sunset Boulevard studio shows her as a pretty, poised 9-year-old --- by that time, already a seasoned actress.

Between ages 4 and 14, she performed in some 50 films.

"I was typically a daughter," she said, and then listed a few of the actresses who played her characters' mothers: Katharine

Hepburn, Norma Shearer, and Claudette Colbert.

Her filmography includes "Les Miserables," "Imitation of Life," "Anthony Adverse" and "Little Women."

Earlier this year, Knowlden's 456-page autobiography, "Little Girl in Big Pictures," was published by BearManor Media.

Though her film acting career ended more than 70 years ago, before World War II, the book is filled with detailed descriptions of the early film industry, as observed through a little girl's eyes.

Now 85, Knowlden could name-drop with the best of them if she wanted to.

She attended Beverly Hills High School, brimming with future stars, and then earned a scholarship to Mills College in the Bay Area.

She would later marry an Army



officer and live in China and Japan, then have three children and be a stay-at-home mom, but after relocating to Fallbrook, CA in 1983, she began acting again --- this time in stage productions.

She also renewed a friendship

with Escondido resident Gloria DeMent, S'43 who once worked as a stand-in for Knowlden on the set of "Rainbow on the River."

It's quickly apparent that Knowlden is fond of that phase of her life, and she said she thought her experience of Hollywood was "very different from the experiences of most children in the films nowadays."

"It seemed normal to me, and I loved it," she said. "My mother would always ask me, 'Now, you do want to do this, Marilyn?' It was my choice; I was never pushed. I loved acting."

This school year saw several personnel changes in the Performing Arts Department and was highlighted by outstanding vocal, instrumental and theatrical performances.

After the departure of Josh Butchart, Brian Michael and Kristie Rutledge, the department welcomed three newcomers to its staff. Brooke Lundy joined the department to teach Technical Theater and co-teach Intro to Theater and Theater Arts Workshop. Lauren Faunville became the new costumer and Irene Gregorio took over the job of departmental accompanist.

Under the direction of Joel Pressman, '67, the Minnesingers and Madrigals attended their annual Idyllwild retreats in October to prepare for their upcoming performance season. Both groups performed at numerous venues in the Beverly Hills area during the holiday season, from Rodeo Drive events to the American Cancer Society's Children's Party. In December they were joined by the choir for the annual Winter Choral Concert, which featured solos by many of our talented students.

In the spring the Madrigals attended the Hawaii Choral Festival at which they competed, attended workshops and studied with various choral directors. They also had the opportunity to sing Hawaiian music with local choirs and returned from the festival with the designation of highest scoring group. Two weeks later the Minnesingers traveled to Orange County and placed 1st among all choirs at the Heritage Music Festival.

The Spring Music Concert was held June 6th and featured all three choral groups, performing a variety of music from Renaissance to Rock N Roll. The evening was highlighted by the presentation of awards to deserving members of each group, and the awarding of the Factor Scholarships for Vocal Study to five deserving singers..

The various instrumental groups, under the direction of Bill Bradbury, participated in numerous competitions and festivals this year, as well as performing several concerts.

The drum line is now being coached by BHHS alum Ben Haroonian, who is a section

leader in the UCLA drum line. The chamber orchestra and marching band both performed at Disneyland and the orchestra, our largest instrumental group, won a silver rating at a Forum Festival in Orange County. At the Southern California School Band and Orchestra Association Festival, the BHHS bands won excellent ratings in performance and superior ratings in site reading.

The marching band received a high honor when it was selected to participate in the week-long festival of music in London, England. The band will travel to England in December, and along with performing several concerts, will march in London's New Years Day parade.

The final performances featuring the various instrumental groups took place June 7th.

The theater department opened the year with *Twilight*: Los Angeles, 1992, an intensely moving production about the Rodney King incident, which was directed by Herb Hall. The production commemorated the 20th anniversary of the occurrence and played to

capacity crowds for four nights. It featured newcomers Brooke Lundy and Lauren Fonville as producer and costumer, respectively. Technical direction was by Annie Terry and BHHS graduate JJ Johnson served as law enforcement consultant.

At the end of first semester, Theater Arts Workshop presented "Scenefest", its annual showcase of scenes.

The musical this year was *Grease*, which featured students from the entire student body. Directed by department chair and theater teacher Herb Hall, the musical showcased 38 student actors and a backstage crew of over 60. This production was unique in that 5 BHHS graduates were members of the production crew. Ash Sroka (TAW/Dance Company) choreographed the production, while Arnold Lesin '03 (Tech) served as Assistant Tech Director/Designer and Will Lorzano (Tech) also worked as Assistant Tech Director. 'One' campaign raises funds for district

The Beverly Hills Education Foundation organized a drive to raise \$1 million for Beverly Hills schools in 2012.

"When I first heard that our district was going to be cutting teachers and positions and counselors ... merely because we couldn't afford the positions, I was angry," said BHEF chairman Jonathan Prince '76. "We have to be able to make decisions based on what's best for our kids, best for our schools...not based on our budget."

Prince, along with superintendent Dick Douglas, BHEF president Annette Saleh, two board members and heads of the PTA, came up with the idea of having a campaign to raise

\$1 million in one week with 100 percent of funds going to pay for teachers' salaries.

The teachers' union and the student government joined in publicizing the campaign to the parents and student body. The Beverly Hills Education Association sent notices home with every K-12 student, requesting donations from parents.

The Associated Student Body at the high school sold black and white bracelets promoting the fundraiser.

"We're finding really generous private families who are donating as much as \$10,000 and \$15,000 and \$25,000 gifts," Prince told Beverly Hills Weekly. We're

finding people who say I can't afford to give anything at all, and yet they give a dollar per day per student in the district. So someone with three kids multiplies 365 times three and writes a check for that much, because even if they can't afford anything, they want to give.

Although the campaign ultimately fell short of its goal of raising \$1 million in a week's time, key positions at the high school were saved.

The Los Angeles Times called the One Campaign "notable for its ambition and speed."

Education Foundation makes a big difference for local schools

Founded in 1978, The Beverly Hills Education Foundation has provided financial support to assist the Beverly Hills Unified School District in achieving excellence in education.

The Foundation (BHEF) was formed as a result of the *Serrano v. Priest* California Supreme Court ruling that made it necessary to equalize the revenue across the many

school districts in the state and ensure that no district received more funding per student than any other district regardless of the tax base of those districts. Soon after proposition 13 was passed, funding was shifted from local to state control. Diminished government support for public education in America has forced communities to form organizations to raise funds

to support education in their cities. The BHEF was the first of its kind and became a national model for over 500 school districts in the nation.

The BHEF schedules various events during the year for the purpose of raising funds and also recognizing individuals and teachers.

The major event is the Apple Ball. The officers and directors of the BHEF

With a district Academic Performance Index score of 891 out of a possible 1000, the BHUSD schools rank in the top five percent of all schools in



California.

We recently learned that after an extensive analysis of student achievement data for every public school in California, the California Business for Education Excellence (CBEE) team named each of our five schools as Honor Roll schools.

The CBEE Honor Roll is the premier school recognition program that uses only academic achievement data showing improved academic growth over time and a closing of the achievement gap.

The CBEE Honor Roll includes 1,614 public elementary, middle and high schools recognized by the California business community for demonstrating consistent high levels of student academic achievement, improvement in achievement levels over time and reduction in achievement gaps among student populations.

For high schools, the Honor Roll recognition also includes measures of college readiness. Furthermore, Newsweek just released their "Top 1000" high school list and Beverly received an overall national ranking of

324 and a California ranking of 49.

When compared to other "open enrollment" high schools, Beverly ranked 200 nationally and 35 in California.

This measureable success is possible because we continue to collaborate and partner with students, parents, alumni, and other valued community stakeholder. Your continued participation as a valued member of the Norman family is appreciated and expected.

Hello to about 1,200 of my fellow Normans and a slight wave of my hand to the remaining 17,000 of you. Why do I greet only 1,200 of you? I'll tell you why. It is because in the last year 1,200 of you have sent in contributions to the Alumni Association and 17,000 of you did not. Last year, we heard from 1,600 of you.

Over the years, we have received hardly any requests that we remove recipients of the Alumni Highlights from our mailing list. As a matter of fact, considerable time is spent updating our database. What I and others do not understand is why so few of you cannot find a few minutes or so to write a check and send us class notes. We even provide you with a return envelope. Beverly High is a pretty small high school and the school district is very small – a total of four (grammar) schools and one high school. Whether or not you realize it,

Beverly High is probably the most famous high school in the country. Students in the school district have a lot in common as Beverly Hills is a small city. The educational system is excellent and living conditions are certainly way above the average of other communities in the U.S. Friendships are made in the various schools in Beverly Hills that last a life time. We receive notes from quite a few readers of the Highlights remarking that the Highlights allows them to keep in touch with classmates and the activities of the graduates and, also, of the high school.

I do not understand the somewhat dismissive attitude of many of you with respect to contributing to our Alumni Association. We have explained at length the various activities of the Alumni Association and the fact that we are completely dependent upon all of you for contributions that will support the Alumni Association. The high

school provides us with a small office. Other than that, neither the high school nor the school district provides any financial support. Our contributions were about \$20,000.00 less in this last year than the previous year. If a few thousand more of you would contribute, we would have enough to provide the high school with some of their needs. As it is, we can barely meet our expenses for the Alumni Association. It is time for many of you to loosen up and make a contribution.

I have been involved with the Alumni Association for 25 years and have served as President, financial officer, publisher of the Highlights and a director of the Association.
